**QUESTIONS & RESPONSES**

- 1. Reaching out in regards to Q&A #5 from Addendum 1 that was released for the subject project. Question 5 states, “Would it be possible to share an excel version of the Pipe and Manhole Rehabilitation/GPS Schedule (sheets 6-9 of 46)?” and the Answer states, “Yes. See attachment to this email”.**  
**Was there supposed to be an excel file attached to the addendum that was sent out yesterday?**
  - a. ALCOSAN provided the excel version via email to all prospective bidders who purchased contract documents.
- 2. What is the start and end date for construction?**
  - a. The contract duration is 365 days after the Notice to Proceed. The Notice to Proceed will be provided following contract award.
- 3. What is the estimated value for this project?**
  - a. Engineer’s Opinion of Probable Construction Cost is \$6.2 Million as provided at the Pre-Bid Meeting.
- 4. Do you have a copy of the plan holders list?**
  - a. The list is not for distribution at this time.
- 5. Do you have any addendums?**
  - a. Addendums are distributed to all prospective bidders who purchased contract documents.
- 6. Can you please clarify on page 18 of 46 on the Upper Saw Mill Run plans note 2 where it states: “contractor will need to remove surcharged bolts on SMR-CS-19 & 18 prior to performing rehabilitation work. Contractor to replace once work is**



**complete.” Is this incidental to lining or is there a pay item for this? Will the bolts be deactivated and safe to remove at time of lining?**

- a. This work is considered incidental to the Manhole Lining bid item. Contractor will be required to coordinate with ALCOSAN Regional Conveyance Interceptor Systems operations team for mobilization and removal of bolts.

- 7. Per the project specifications on page 459 of 601 it states: 2. Length: *The length of the liner shall be that which is deemed necessary by the Contractor to effectively carry out the insertion and seal the liner at the inlet and outlet of the manhole. Individual inversion runs may be made over one or two manhole to manhole sections up to a total length of 1,000 linear feet as determined by ALCOSAN***

**These two statements seem to contradict each other, is the contractor allowed to install CIPP greater than 2 manhole runs and longer than 1,000 LF?**

- a. Proposed lining lengths greater than 1000 feet need to go through the submittal process and need to be reviewed and approved by the owner.

- 8. Will the contractor need approval from ALCOSAN on inversions or CIPP schedule?**

- a. Yes.

- 9. Would the owner please host a site visit for the Ohio River site CSX – Genessee Wyoming Railroad right of way (drawing sheets 27 to 30) to assist the contractors with discussing constructability concerns?**

- a. For the sites along the Lower Ohio, Barge access is the baseline assumption. Additionally, access is not available to bidders, but will be made to the selected contractor.

- 10. Does the owner have any previous contacts from the assessment phase that may assist or perform the Barge access / rental?**

- a. It is assumed that the contractor may need to subcontract services with a barge company if required.



- 11. Would the owner consider extending the Q/A deadline by 1 week?**
  - a. Yes, the Q&A deadline will be extended until June 27th.
  
- 12. The CIPP specification section 02769 3.07.G. states all pipe connections shall be watertight. Mainline CIPP does not create a watertight lateral connection. This would require lateral grouting or CIPP lateral lining post-reinstatement. Does the owner intend for laterals to be rehabilitated on this project? If so, would the owner add a separate bid item for this work?**
  - a. Lateral rehabilitation is not included in the scope of the project.
  
- 13. Will the contractor have local hydrant access for pipe cleaning & rehabilitation activities?**
  - a. The contractor will need to contact the local water companies and make provisions for water usage per Section 02769 Article 3. 02.
  
- 14. Will the contractor be required to replace trees if removal is required for construction access? If so, can the owner provide a re-planting / restoration schedule?**
  - a. Tree Removal and Replacement is considered incidental to the work.
  
- 15. The instruction to bidders (section #2A-2) states the contract duration is 450 days. The Addendum #1 documents state 365 days. Would the owner please clarify the contract duration? Would the owner consider extending the contract duration to allow for 2 windows/periods of stream work due to the time of year access restrictions?**
  - a. The contract duration has been revised to 365 days in Article 2 Information For Bidders, Attachment A per Addendum 2.



- 16. In section 02769 on page 7 it states; “The contractor shall also be aware that minor variations in pipe diameter and circumference will occur, that is not intended that such minor variations be indicated on the plans and that such variation will not be considered as ground for additional claims for compensation”**
- **What if a pipe is out of round?**
  - **If the diameter of the pipe is not as listed and is not another diameter on the bid form (i.e. 16” or 21”), will the owner delete that segment?**
- a. The contractor will be required to verify all drawing measurements in the field prior to lining. Ovality shall be accounted for in CIPP liner thickness calculations per ASTM F1216.
- 17. In section 02769 on page 7-8 it states; “...the liner shall be constructed to withstand inversion pressures, have sufficient strength bridge missing pipe, stretch to fit irregular pipe sections, and shall invert smoothly around bends”**
- **Is it the expectation of the Owner that the contractor will install CIPP in host pipes with gaps and missing pipe sections?**
  - **Lining through bends is doable, however, there will wrinkles or “fins” in the liner – is that acceptable to the Owner?**
- a. As required by the contract. Existing CCTV inspections have been made available where possible for bidder review. No significant gaps are identified in the host pipe.
- b. Minimal wrinkles may be acceptable depending on the pre-installation CCTV. Please be aware that a section of the Upper Saw Mill Run interceptor was previously lined and significant wrinkles exist that need to be lined through. There is one section that is to be removed with an open cut point repair prior to lining.
- 18. In section 02769 on page 11 it states; “samples shall be taken from each liner thickness at each liner insertion manhole”**
- **Will the owner instead allow 1 sample from each diameter in each area?**
- a. No. Samples shall be taken with each inversion.





**19. In section 02769 on page 12 it states; “the liner bag shall impregnated with resin not more than 24 hours before the proposed time of installation and stored out of direct sunlight at a temperature of less than 39 degrees Fahrenheit”**

➤ **Will the owner remove this requirement? Liner can be Wetout and stored in climate-controlled environments for as long as 6 months.?**

- a. Per Contract Documents wet-out of the liner shall be done at the manufacturer’s facility. On-site wet-out will not be allowed. The liner shall be maintained at the manufacturer’s recommended temperature in refrigerated facilities to prevent premature curing at all times prior to installation. The liner shall be protected from UV light prior to installation. Any liner showing evidence of premature curing will be rejected for use and will be removed from the site immediately. 24-hour requirement can be removed from the specification, however each liner must be accompanied by a manufacturer certificate of conformity and a manufacturer wet-out report. Wet-out at a non-manufacturer facility will not be accepted.

**20. In section 02769 on page 23 it states; “contractor will finish each site 100% before mobilizing to the next site. Finishing a site includes cutting/trimming each service lateral open and receiving approval by the Construction Manager for submitted data sheets, CCTV DVDs, continuous temperature verification gradient chart and video logs”**

➤ **Can you clarify this? Does this mean each area can only be worked on individually? If a contractor can gain efficiencies by having multiple crews working at once in different areas will that be allowed?**

- a. The contractor will need to seek ALCOSAN approval to work at multiple sites concurrently. This statement is intended to mean that all work on a given project area shall be completed in one mobilization and the Contractor shall not demobilize from a project area before completing all required work including but not limited to E/S set up, MPT set up, bypass pumping, cleaning, lining of sewers, and lining of manholes. Bypass shall not be removed until all pipeline and manhole rehabilitation work is completed. Refer to milestone deadlines presented at the pre-bid conference.



- 21. Is dye testing considered incidental to the CIPP lining?**
- a. Dye testing is not indicated in the contract documents. Should dye testing be required as directed by the Owner, payment will be negotiated separately.
- 22. Is there an approved location for dumping materials obtained during cleaning operations?**
- **Is there a charge for dumping materials?**
  - a. The approved locations for debris disposal are listed in Article 2 Paragraph 2.6. Debris hauling and disposal to the approved location removed during drag bucket cleaning will be paid via contingent bid item C-49. Debris hauling and disposal for all other types of cleaning activities will be considered incidental.
- 23. Will the owner consider a separate pay item for requested testing? Contractors cannot budget for testing requests when it's at the discretion of the Owner and there is no pay item for it.**
- a. Requirements for testing of CIPP liners is included within the contract documents and clarified above. Should test results not meet the necessary strength requirements the Owner may require additional testing at the Contractor's expense.
- 24. Will the owner consider extending the bid date 2 weeks until 7/16/25? All other start dates, completion dates & milestones would not be effected?**
- a. The bid receipt date is extended to July 9th, 2025. Milestone deadlines remain unchanged.

Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (iii)).

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The body of each wage determination lists the classifications and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the type(s) of construction and geographic area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order under rate identifiers indicating whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate), a survey rate, a weighted union average rate, a state adopted rate, or a supplemental classification rate.

#### Union Rate Identifiers

A four-letter identifier beginning with characters other than ""SU"", ""UAVG"", ?SA?, or ?SC? denotes that a union rate was prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2024. PLUM is an identifier of the union whose collectively bargained rate prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. The date, 07/01/2024 in the example, is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all changes over time that are reported to WHD in the rates

in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing the classification.

#### Union Average Rate Identifiers

The UAVG identifier indicates that no single rate prevailed for those classifications, but that 100% of the data reported for the classifications reflected union rates. EXAMPLE:

UAVG-OH-0010 01/01/2024. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the State of Ohio. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/01/2024 in the example, indicates the date the wage determination was updated to reflect the most current union average rate.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January, to reflect a weighted average of the current rates in the collective bargaining agreements on which the rate is based.

#### Survey Rate Identifiers

The ""SU"" identifier indicates that either a single non-union rate prevailed (as defined in 29 CFR 1.2) for this classification in the survey or that the rate was derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As a weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SUFL2022-007 6/27/2024. SU indicates the rate is a single non-union prevailing rate or a weighted average of survey data for that classification. FL indicates the State of Florida. 2022 is the year of the survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 6/27/2024 in the example, indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

?SU? wage rates typically remain in effect until a new survey is conducted. However, the Wage and Hour Division (WHD) has the discretion to update such rates under 29 CFR 1.6(c)(1).

#### State Adopted Rate Identifiers

The ""SA"" identifier indicates that the classifications and prevailing wage rates set by a state (or local) government were adopted under 29 C.F.R 1.3(g)-(h). Example: SAME2023-007 01/03/2024. SA reflects that the rates are state adopted. ME refers to the State of Maine. 2023 is the year during which the state completed the survey on which the listed classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/03/2024 in the example, reflects the date on which the classifications and rates under the ?SA? identifier took effect under state law in the state from which the rates were adopted.

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#### WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- a) a survey underlying a wage determination
- b) an existing published wage determination

- c) an initial WHD letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- d) an initial conformance (additional classification and rate) determination

Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (iii)).

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The body of each wage determination lists the classifications and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the type(s) of construction and geographic area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order under rate identifiers indicating whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate), a survey rate, a weighted union average rate, a state adopted rate, or a supplemental classification rate.

#### Union Rate Identifiers

A four-letter identifier beginning with characters other than ""SU"", ""UAVG"", ?SA?, or ?SC? denotes that a union rate was prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2024. PLUM is an identifier of the union whose collectively bargained rate prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. The date, 07/01/2024 in the example, is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all changes over time that are reported to WHD in the rates in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing the classification.

#### Union Average Rate Identifiers

The UAVG identifier indicates that no single rate prevailed for those classifications, but that 100% of the data reported for the classifications reflected union rates. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 01/01/2024. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the State of Ohio. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/01/2024 in the example, indicates the date the wage determination was updated to reflect the most current union average rate.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January, to reflect a weighted average of the current rates in the collective bargaining agreements on which the rate is based.

#### Survey Rate Identifiers

The ""SU"" identifier indicates that either a single non-union rate prevailed (as defined in 29 CFR 1.2) for this classification in the survey or that the rate was derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As a weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SUFL2022-007 6/27/2024. SU indicates the rate is a single non-union

prevailing rate or a weighted average of survey data for that classification. FL indicates the State of Florida. 2022 is the year of the survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 6/27/2024 in the example, indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

?SU? wage rates typically remain in effect until a new survey is conducted. However, the Wage and Hour Division (WHD) has the discretion to update such rates under 29 CFR 1.6(c)(1).

#### State Adopted Rate Identifiers

The ""SA"" identifier indicates that the classifications and prevailing wage rates set by a state (or local) government were adopted under 29 C.F.R 1.3(g)-(h). Example: SAME2023-007 01/03/2024. SA reflects that the rates are state adopted. ME refers to the State of Maine. 2023 is the year during which the state completed the survey on which the listed classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/03/2024 in the example, reflects the date on which the classifications and rates under the ?SA? identifier took effect under state law in the state from which the rates were adopted.

#### ----- WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- a) a survey underlying a wage determination
- b) an existing published wage determination
- c) an initial WHD letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- d) an initial conformance (additional classification and rate) determination

**ATTACHMENT C  
(RAILROAD INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS)**



Limits may be satisfied by any combination of primary and excess or umbrella per occurrence policies. In the event that the required limits must be satisfied by a combination of primary and excess or umbrella coverage, the policies shall provide drop down coverage and provide at least as broad coverage as the underlying policies.

- b) Policy shall provide that "Port Authority of Allegheny County d/b/a Pittsburgh Regional Transit" be named as additional insured for the named insured's full limits of coverage on a primary basis, but in no case less than the limits specified; and shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation clause with respect to PRT, and neither the named insured nor its insurer shall have any claim against PRT to the extent the claim is or should have

been covered by such insurance.

c. Business Automobile Liability

1) With a Combined Single Limit not less than:

2) Notes:

a). Policy shall cover the use of all owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles.

b). Policy shall provide that “Port Authority of Allegheny County d/b/a Pittsburgh Regional Transit” be named as an additional insured for the named insured’s full limits of coverage on a primary and non-contributory basis, but in no case less than the limits specified. Policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation clause with respect to PRT, and neither Licensee nor its insurer shall have any claim against PRT to the extent the claim is or should have been covered by insurance.

d. Approval

No work shall commence on the Property under this Agreement until it has forwarded to PRT, for review and approval, certificate(s) of the insurance required. PRT shall be given a minimum of 30 days’ notice in the event of change or cancellation of any of the insurance required. The fact that the insurance required in this Agreement has been provided shall in no manner lessen nor affect other obligations set forth in any provision of this Agreement. The policies of insurance referenced above are not to contain any deductible or self-insured retention, as applicable to PRT as an additional insured. In the event the insurance policies purchased pursuant to the above insurance requirements contain any deductible or self-insured retention provisions, the named insured shall provide PRT with disclosure of said deductible or self-insurance retention prior to execution of the Contract, which will be subject to AUTHORITY approval. If PRT approves any insurance policy that includes a deductible or self-insured retention, the named insured shall be responsible for payment of any and all deductibles or self-insured retentions, whether owing from the named insured or PRT as an additional insured, applicable to the policies of insurance referenced above

e. Certificate Holder.

12. Waiver of Claims. ALCOSAN expressly waives, for itself and its members, employees, agents, consultants, contractors, subcontractors, successors or assigns, including but not limited to KDG and Contractor, the right to bring any claim or suit against PRT, or to add PRT as an additional defendant to any claim or suit, for any property damage, loss, or injury, including death, arising out of or in connection with the Project or otherwise relating to the use by ALCOSAN's of the Property pursuant to this Agreement., except to the extent solely caused by AUTHORITY's negligence or willful misconduct.

13. Mechanics' Liens. Upon instruction by PRT and at PRT's sole discretion, except to the extent prohibited by any applicable law, ALCOSAN shall execute, deliver, and file with the Prothonotary of Allegheny County a Waiver of Mechanics' Lien in a form reasonably acceptable to PRT. ALCOSAN shall, to the extent permitted by applicable law, include in its contracts with any contractors or subcontractors, including KDG and Contractor, a general waiver of mechanics' liens.

14. No Recordation. This Agreement is not intended to vest in ALCOSAN any easement or interest in the Property whatsoever other than a temporary license. Neither ALCOSAN nor PRT shall record this Agreement in the Office of the Allegheny County, Pennsylvania Department of Real Estate, Recorder of Deeds or similar office.

15. Term; Termination. The term of this Agreement shall commence on the date first written above and shall continue thereafter until otherwise terminated pursuant to the terms of this Section 15. In the event that ALCOSAN fails to comply with any obligation contained in this Agreement and such failure continue for a period of thirty (30) days after ALCOSAN's receipt of written notice of such failure from PRT, PRT shall have the right to immediately terminate this Agreement. In the event of termination of this Agreement, ALCOSAN shall repair any damage

## Section 5 - Insurance Requirements - US Roads

**Insurance Requirements prior to any construction project** - Both the Utility Owner and the Contractor completing installation are required to provide proof of current Commercial General Liability Insurance. Prior to construction the Contractor is required to provide current proof of Railroad Protective Liability Insurance.

**General Liability Insurance** must meet the minimum requirements of \$2M per occurrence and \$6M aggregate per the terms of the written contract.

**Automobile Insurance** must meet the minimum requirements of \$1M bodily injury and property damage per occurrence.

The General Liability certificate is required to show proof of **CG2417 or its equivalent**. (*Contractual Liability Railroads*)

Evidence of **Workers Compensation** must be provided on certificate and meet the minimum requirements of \$1M. Certificate Holder naming (specified Railroad) **\*\*Specified Railroad names can be found at [www.gwrr.com](http://www.gwrr.com)\*\***

General Liability, Automobile Liability and Umbrella/Excess Liability provides additional insured status to the certificate holder and any other party(ies) specified in or required by written contract between the named insured and the certificate holder.

Where applicable and permitted by law, all policies include a blanket automatic waiver of subrogation endorsement that provides this feature in favor of the certificate holder and any other party(ies) specified in or required by written contract between the named insured and the certificate holder.

**Prior to Construction or any access within 50' of Railroad** a current **Certificate of Railroad Protective Liability insurance (RPL)** which shows the **specific Railroad** as named Insured. If the Contractor does not carry a policy of Railroad Protective Liability insurance, this coverage can be secured through the railroad. An application and current Fee structure for this coverage is available upon request.

**\*\*Insurance Requirements for potentially hazardous pipelines such as natural gas, oil, petroleum, etc. to be amended as shown below\*\***

**General Liability Insurance** which names the **specific Railroad** as additional insured and must meet the limits of **\$5M per occurrence and \$10M aggregate**. Such policy shall be endorsed to provide Waiver of Subrogation in favor of the certificate holder per written contract.

**Pollution Legal Liability Insurance** with minimum limits of **Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000)** per occurrence naming the **certificate holder** as additional insured per written contract. Such policy shall be endorsed to provide Waiver of Subrogation in favor of the certificate holder per written contract.

**Insurance**

CSX requires that insurance coverage be provided prior to any entry and/or work activity within the railroad corridor. The agreement will define the requirement in greater detail but for summary purposes, the following identifies the components:

- 5) License Fees: The application fee does not encompass charges imposed by NS for the utility license, insurance, flagging services, and other matters.

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## MAINTENANCE OF EXISTING FACILITIES

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Entry onto NS property for the purpose of maintaining existing facilities requires advance notice by submitting an online application that shall include the following:

- ♦ A complete application package as stated above
- ♦ Copy of the current agreement, with NS, for the facility, including exhibits
- ♦ Written confirmation that applicant will pay within thirty (30) days after delivery of an invoice, for all protection and construction monitoring costs incurred by NS or its representatives.

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## EMERGENCY ENTRY

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Emergency entry will be coordinated within a reasonable response time depending upon the circumstances.

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## INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

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The NS insurance requirements will be defined in the license agreement. In general, each agreement will require:

- 1) Payment of a risk financing fee of \$1,900 per installation to add the project to NS's Master Railroad Protective Policy. This will satisfy the railroad protective liability insurance requirement in its entirety for the project.
- 2) A certificate of Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence for injury to or death of persons and damage to or loss or destruction of property. *Access will not be authorized until all insurance requirements are satisfied.*
  - a. The certificate must name as Certificate Holders, Norfolk Southern Corporation, Subsidiaries and Affiliates at 650 West Peachtree Street, Box 46, Atlanta, GA 30308 and endorsed to be Additional Insured to all applicable policies as required by written contract. All policies maintained in which Norfolk Southern Corporation, Subsidiaries and Affiliates have been endorsed as Additional Insured shall include a waiver of subrogation and shall be primary and non-contributory. All policies shall be endorsed to provide 30 days' notice of cancellation.
  - b. The Certificate of Insurance (COI) shall be uploaded into the application portal prior to NS executing the license or right of entry agreement.

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## RAILROAD RIGHT OF WAY

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It is recommended that you obtain current property ownership information from local sources typically used for this purpose, such as County deeds. After receipt of an application, RailPros will verify and provide railroad right-of-way widths and parcel information for agreement preparation, but without any warranty (by RailPros or NS) as to their accuracy. If the right-of-way width is critical for plan development, please first submit an application, after which RailPros will coordinate final plan preparation with you.
